## SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

So many cancelled plans this weekend! I must admit I have been thinking with envy of some of St Paul's word: "I have learned to be content with whatever I have... In any and all circumstances, I have learned the secret... of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me." (Phil. 4.11-13)

'In any and all circumstances'. That's the bit that gets me. Paul is speaking of uncertainties about having food, shelter, clothing – none of it could be taken for granted on his apostolic journeys.

I faced very different uncertainties over the past few days: do we have to cancel playgroup again? Can the church gather to glorify God this Sunday? Do I have to cancel my dinner plans tomorrow night?

For others the questions might be different: Is my soccer game cancelled? Will I be able to go to work? Can I afford not to? Will I be allowed to sit down for a coffee at the shops?

Perhaps at a deeper level: how isolated will I be in the coming week? Who will be isolated or anxious around me?

In the face of such uncertainties, O for Paul's equanimity! What was his 'secret'?

Well, for one thing, Paul had a purpose that was relevant to any and every circumstance: to invite Jesus to meet him in the midst of it all, to inspire his thoughts and reactions ('I can do all things through him who strengthens me'); to let his every joy and trial deepen his knowledge of God's nature in Christ: "I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings...Not that I have already...reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own..."

Whatever the circumstances he couldn't control, he could devote himself to this task: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry...but in everything...let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

Whatever delights or disappointments come our way this week, nothing can stop us, either, from sharing in that purpose that gave shape and meaning to Paul's life. Nothing prevents us from praying, sometimes in confusion, sometimes as an act of the will rather than really 'feeling it', yet always with hope and trust: daily to a deeper faith, move us, daily draw us nearer to you.

Eternal God,

author of our life and end of our pilgrimage: guide us by your word and Spirit amid all perils and temptations,

that we may not wander from your way, but may run our course in safety until we come to our eternal rest in you; through the grace of Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.** 

#### FIRST READING

A reading from the second book of Samuel

When the king was settled in his palace, and the LORD had given him rest from all his surrounding enemies, the king said to the prophet Nathan, "Look! I'm living in a cedar palace, but God's chest is housed in a tent!"

Nathan said to the king, "Go ahead and do whatever you are thinking, because the LORD is with you."

But that very night the LORD's word came to Nathan: Go to my servant David and tell him: This is what the LORD says: You are not the one to build the temple for me to live in. In fact, I haven't lived in a temple from the day I brought Israel out of Egypt until now. Instead, I have been travelling around in a tent and in a dwelling. Throughout my travelling around with the Israelites, did I ever ask any of Israel's tribal leaders I appointed to shepherd my people: Why haven't you built me a cedar temple?

So then, say this to my servant David: This is what the LORD of heavenly forces says: I took you from the pasture, from following the flock, to be leader over my people Israel. I've been with you wherever you've gone, and I've eliminated all your enemies before you. Now I will make your name great—like the name of the greatest people on earth. I'm going to provide a place for my people Israel, and plant them so that they may live there and no longer be disturbed. Cruel people will no longer trouble them, as they had been earlier, when I appointed leaders over my people Israel. And I will give you rest from all your enemies.

And the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make a dynasty for you. When the time comes for you to die and you lie down with your ancestors, I will raise up your descendant—one of your very own children—to succeed you, and I will establish his kingdom. He will build a temple for my name, and I will establish his royal throne forever. I will be a father to him, and he will be a son to me.'

(7.1-14a; CEB)

Like the moon that is established for ever: and stands in the heavens for evermore.

#### SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Ephesians


So remember that once you were Gentiles by physical descent, who were called "uncircumcised" by Jews who are physically circumcised. At that time you were without Christ. You were aliens rather than citizens of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of God's promise. In this world you had no hope and no God. But now, thanks to Christ Jesus, you who once were so far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.

Christ is our peace. He made both Jews and Gentiles into one group. With his body, he broke down the barrier of hatred that divided us. He cancelled the detailed rules of the Law so that he could create one new person out of the two groups, making peace. He reconciled them both as one body to God by the cross, which ended the hostility to God.

When he came, he announced the good news of peace to you who were far away from God and to those who were near. We both have access to the Father through Christ by the one Spirit. So now you are no longer strangers and aliens. Rather, you are fellow citizens with God's people, and you belong to God's household. As God's household, you are built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. The whole building is joined together in him, and it grows up into a temple that is dedicated to the Lord. Christ is building you into a place where God lives through the Spirit.

Hear the word of the Lord.

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark.

The apostles returned to Jesus and told him everything they had done and taught. Many people were coming and going, so there was no time to eat. He said to the apostles, "Come by yourselves to a secluded place and rest for a while." They departed in a boat by themselves for a deserted place.

Many people saw them leaving and recognized them, so they ran ahead from all the cities and arrived before them. When Jesus arrived and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd. Then he began to teach them many things.

When Jesus and his disciples had crossed the lake, they landed at Gennesaret, anchored the boat, and came ashore. People immediately recognised Jesus and ran around that whole region bringing sick people on their mats to wherever they heard he was. Wherever he went—villages, cities, or farming communities—they would place the sick in the marketplaces and beg him to allow them to touch even the hem of his clothing. Everyone who touched him was healed.
