# SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

Recover. Reinvent. Reframe. Release.

These are four possible scenarios for churches as we look beyond the COVID-19 pandemic, according to a document from the diocese which Parish Council has been exploring over the last couple of months. Will we go back to how things were before? Will we become something quite different? Will be adjust and recalibrate our activities in the light of what we've experienced? Will we recognise that it's time for something new to emerge?

Of course, all of these have been happening in different ways already, over the last 18 months. We have learned to do new things that we might never have imagined. We have learned to do without things in ways we might never have imagined. We are still very much in the midst of discerning the way forward, in the light of all that has happened.

One of our three mission areas (at the top of this page) is 'serving others': it invites us to ask, how might we be a blessing, indeed God's blessing, to our local community? This happens in many ways, including our op shop, playgroups, and nursing home services. For many years until 2020, our Friday Soup and Sandwiches lunch at St Eanswythe's was a significant ministry in the community, and that hasn't resumed at this point: both because of COVID-safe restrictions and also because there are fewer volunteers available.

This is an important moment for us to stop and reflect on the larger question: What is the best way of using the energy and resources available to our parish, to serve the wider community as followers and disciples of Jesus?

Parish Council is inviting you to join a conversation exploring this question, as detailed in an invitation letter accompanying the pew sheet this week. (Please do be in touch if you haven't received the letter.) If you are interested in this question, then you are welcome at the conversation! We hope that this will be an opportunity for a renewed clarity and purpose in our presence in the community.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Merciful God, whose holy apostle James, leaving his father and all that he had, was obedient to the calling of your Son Jesus Christ and followed him even to death: help us, forsaking the false attractions of the world, to be ready at all times to answer your call without delay; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.** 

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah

In the fourth year of Judah's King Jehoiakim, Josiah's son, Baruch was writing in a scroll the words that Jeremiah was dictating to him. Jeremiah the prophet told Baruch, Neriah's son:

"This is what the LORD the God of Israel proclaims about you, Baruch:

"You have said, 'I can't take it anymore! The LORD has added sorrow to my pain. I'm worn out from groaning and can find no rest.'

"This is what you should say to him: 'The LORD proclaims: I'm breaking down everything I have built up. I'm digging up that which I have planted—the entire land.

"You seek great things for yourself, but don't bother. I'm bringing disaster on all humanity, declares the LORD, but wherever you go I will let you escape with your life."

SECOND READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

About that time, some prophets came down from Jerusalem to Antioch. One of them, Agabus, stood up and, inspired by the Spirit, predicted that a severe famine would overtake the entire Roman world. (This occurred during Claudius' rule.)

The disciples decided they would send support to the brothers and sisters in Judea, with everyone contributing to this ministry according to each person's abundance. They sent Barnabas and Saul to take this gift to the elders.

About that time King Herod began to harass some who belonged to the church. He had James, John's brother, killed with a sword. When he saw that this pleased the Jews, he arrested Peter as well. This happened during the Festival of Unleavened Bread.

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew

Then the mother of Zebedee's sons came to Jesus along with her sons. Bowing before him, she asked a favour of him.

"What do you want?" he asked.

She responded, "Grant that these two sons of mine will sit, one on your right hand and one on your left, in your kingdom."

Jesus replied, "You don't know what you're asking! Can you drink from the cup that I'm about to drink from?"

They said to him, "We can."

He said to them, "You will drink from my cup, but to sit at my right or left hand isn't mine to give. It belongs to those for whom it has been prepared by my Father."


Now when the other ten disciples heard about this, they became angry with the two brothers.

But Jesus called them over and said, "You know that those who rule the Gentiles show off their authority over them and their high-ranking officials order them around. But that's not the way it will be with you. Whoever wants to be great among you will be your servant. Whoever wants to be first among you will be your slave—just as the Human One didn't come to be served but rather to serve and to give his life to liberate many people."

# JAMES, APOSTLE AND MARTYR

There are two of the twelve apostles who are named James. One of them is introduced as the brother of John: they are sons of the fisherman Zebedee, and together with Simon Peter they become the inner circle of Jesus' disciples. This James is sometimes called James "the Great", to distinguish him from the other James ("the Less"), about whom we know very little.

James the son of Zebedee was the first of the apostles to be martyred, and the only one whose martyrdom is recorded in the New Testament (in today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles).

Tradition holds that James made a missionary journey to Spain, and that after his death his body was taken and buried there. James became the patron saint of Spain, and his supposed burial place, Santiago (Saint James) de Compostela, became a significant place of pilgrimage in the Middle Ages.

The traditional pilgrimage route, the Way of St James (*Camino de Santiago*), continues to attract people from all over the world, and has featured in books and films. In 2018, over 300,000 people officially registered as completing the final 100 kilometres of the walk—many of them would have walked much further, starting 800 kilometres away near the French border.


# **NOTES AND NEWS**
