## SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends.

Like everyone else, during the last week I was completing my census details, and came to the question about religion. How frustrating it was to find that my religion didn't appear on the list!

What I mean is that *Anglican* is not a religion, any more than Catholic, Uniting Church, Presbyterian or Baptist. Our religion is *Christian*, reaching back to the earliest days of the followers of Jesus: Acts 11.26 records that "it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called *Christians*."

Anglican identity is simply a way, a strand, a tradition of being Christian. Many of us deeply value this Anglican way and have found here the living water of Christ; and it does have certain distinctive features (some of them more fruitful than others!), which are good for us to understand. But we cannot be Anglican without first being Christian: this is seen, for example, in the fact that there is no such thing as Anglican baptism – those baptised in our midst are baptised into the whole church of Christ.

So what a pity it is that the census question apparently invites us to retreat into the divisions of previous generations, where the things that separated different Christians were more important than all that they held in common. Some of you have known that reality in situations where it has divided families and even caused bloodshed. It would be a step forward if, in a future census, this question invited us to identify as "Christian (Anglican)", and so to claim our common Christian identity with those of other churches.

These questions of Christian identity are particularly pointed on this day when we celebrate Mary, the mother of Jesus. During the history of the western Church, the various attitudes, beliefs and practices surrounding Mary have often been contentious and divisive. In the first Anglican prayer book of 1662, and even still in the first Australian prayer book of 1978, this day was not included in the calendar of feasts. Only in the more recent 1995 book (*A Prayer Book for Australia*) was 15 August restored to the calendar, celebrating Mary's distinctive ministry and witness.

This return to ancient tradition comes alongside ongoing ecumenical dialogue which seeks to bridge historic differences. In 2004 the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission published an agreed statement on Mary, including these words:

Mary, the mother of our Lord Jesus Christ, stands before us as an exemplar of faithful obedience, and her "Be it to me according to your word" is the grace-filled response each of us is called to make to God, both personally and communally, as the Church, the body of Christ.

How will we, like Mary, say *yes* to God during the coming week? Grace and peace to you, Chris

Nations will see your righteousness, all kings your glory.

You will be called by a new name,

which the LORD's own mouth will determine. You will be a splendid garland in the LORD's hand, a royal turban in the palm of God's hand.'

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke

In those days Caesar Augustus declared that everyone throughout the empire should be enrolled in the tax lists. This first enrolment occurred when Quirinius governed Syria. Everyone went to their own cities to be enrolled. Since Joseph belonged to David's house and family line, he went up from the city of Nazareth in Galilee to David's city, called Bethlehem, in Judea. He went to be enrolled together with Mary, who was promised to him in marriage and who was pregnant. While they were there, the time came for Mary to have her baby. She gave birth to her firstborn child, a son, wrapped him snugly, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the guestroom.
