SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

What is your first response to today's reading from the book of Proverbs? Is it irredeemably dated, sexist and patriarchal—even somewhat embarrassing to claim and read as part of our scriptures?

From the perspective of our time and place in the world, we may well have the luxury and even obligation to critique a text like this, and to insist that we would not use these words ourselves without significant qualification or nuancing.

On the other hand, it's worth noticing that this remarkable woman is in fact being held up and honoured, as someone who is fully in control of her destiny: she is honoured for her capability, prosperity, wisdom, humility and faith. Her husband is known by reference to her, as much as or more than the other way round.

In many parts of our world today, meanwhile, countless women are busy walking many kilometres each day to collect water and can only dream of being prosperous entrepreneurs. In these developing countries, the more pressing reality is that the future rests with women: it has long been accepted in development work that educating and empowering women is a key means of securing a community's future. The United Nations reported earlier this year that the COVID-19 pandemic "has tested and even reversed progress in expanding women's rights and opportunities. Women have not recovered lost jobs and income, hunger is on the rise, and school closures threaten girls' educational gains."

Closer to home in Australia, we continue to be confronted by the systemic abuse and inequality which stretches from Parliament House to the houses in our street. COVID-19 restrictions have made life even harder for the many people, the overwhelming majority of them women, where home is not safe due to family violence in its many forms.

So, even if reading this passage from Proverbs is uncomfortable or embarrassing, we shouldn't let that cultural mismatch lead us into complacency that we know better. Here in our own communities, we too still need to hear that it is a loss for everyone when women are not given honour and dignity. And yes, the church needs to hear this too, and to change in many ways and many places—that is a long and ongoing process of transformation in which we all have a part.

A reading from the book of Proverbs

A competent wife, how does one find her? Her value is far above pearls.

Her husband entrusts his heart to her, and with her he will have all he needs.

She brings him good and not trouble all the days of her life.

She seeks out wool and flax;

she works joyfully with her hands.

She is like a fleet of merchant ships, bringing food from a distance.

She gets up while it is still night, providing food for her household, even some for her female servants.

She surveys a field and acquires it;

from her own resources, she plants a vineyard.

She works energetically;

her arms are powerful. She realises that her trading is successful;

she doesn't put out her lamp at night.

She puts her hands to the spindle; her palms grasp the whorl.

She reaches out to the needy;

she stretches out her hands to the poor.

She doesn't fear for her household when it snows, because they are all dressed in warm clothes.

She makes bedspreads for herself;

fine linen and purple are her clothing.

Her husband is known in the city gates

when he sits with the elders of the land.

She makes garments and sells them; she supplies sashes to traders.

Strength and honour are her clothing; she is confident about the future.

Her mouth is full of wisdom;

kindly teaching is on her tongue.

She is vigilant over the activities of her household; she doesn't eat the food of laziness.

Her children bless her;

her husband praises her:

"Many women act competently,

but you surpass them all!"

Charm is deceptive and beauty fleeting,

but a woman who fears the LORD is to be praised.

Let her share in the results of her work;

let her deeds praise her in the city gates.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of James

My brothers and sisters, not many of you should become teachers, because we know that we teachers will be judged more strictly. We all make mistakes often, but those who don't make mistakes with their words have reached full maturity. Like a bridled horse, they can control themselves entirely. When we bridle horses and put bits in their mouths to lead them wherever we want, we can control their whole bodies.

Consider ships: They are so large that strong winds are needed to drive them. But pilots direct their ships wherever they want with a little rudder. In the same way, even though the tongue is a small part of the body, it boasts wildly.

Think about this: A small flame can set a whole forest on fire. The tongue is a small flame of fire, a world of evil at work in us. It contaminates our entire lives. Because of it, the circle of life is set on fire. The tongue itself is set on fire by the flames of hell.

People can tame and already have tamed every kind of animal, bird, reptile, and fish. No one can tame the tongue, though. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we both bless the Lord and Father and curse human beings made in God's likeness. Blessing and cursing come from the same mouth. My brothers and sisters, it just shouldn't be this way!

Both fresh water and salt water don't come from the same spring, do they? My brothers and sisters, can a fig tree produce olives? Can a grapevine produce figs? Of course not, and fresh water doesn't flow from a saltwater spring either.

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

From there Jesus and his followers went through Galilee, but he didn't want anyone to know it. This was because he was teaching his disciples, "The Human One will be delivered into human hands. They will kill him. Three days after he is killed he will rise up." But they didn't understand this kind of talk, and they were afraid to ask him.

They entered Capernaum. When they had come into a house, he asked them, "What were you arguing about during the journey?" They didn't respond, since on the way they had been debating with each other about who was the greatest. He sat down, called the Twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be least of all and the servant of all." Jesus reached for a little child, placed him among the Twelve, and embraced him. Then he said, "Whoever welcomes one of these children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me isn't actually welcoming me but rather the one who sent me."
