## SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

It's only a little over a month ago that our news was dominated by the situation in Afghanistan, with countless people seeking to flee to safety outside the reach of the incoming Taliban regime. The news cycle has now largely moved on to focus on other things, mainly to do with COVID-19 here in Victoria and Australia, but the situation in Afghanistan remain bleak for many: some of the retribution and oppression which many feared, is apparently now coming to pass.

During last month a remarkably wide coalition of Australian churches and Christian groups issued a call to the Australian government, to respond to this crisis in four particular ways, reflecting Gospel values of hospitality, care and compassion:

- ♦ welcome refugees from Afghanistan
- protect people from Afghanistan in Australia
- ◊ reunite refugee families
- ♦ support through humanitarian aid

At our last Parish Council meeting, we agreed to sign this petition as a parish—you can see that we are listed there on the above website, alongside many other churches from across the country. The petition is also open to individuals to sign, and so we encourage you to add your personal voice to this call—you can do this at the same website above.

Parish Council also discussed the roadmap for the coming months as we emerge from the current lockdown. At present, worship in churches is one of many activities which will be able to resume around the first week of November, depending on levels of vaccination in the wider community. Other measures including masks, checking in and social distancing will still be with us for a while yet; and as is the case for various other venues, there will be some activities for which participants need to have proof of double vaccination. So life is not going to become simpler quite yet, but we can certainly look forward to seeing each other again in person!

A reading from the book of Job

A man in the land of Uz was named Job. That man was honest, a person of absolute integrity; he feared God and avoided evil.

[...]

One day the divine beings came to present themselves before the LORD. The Adversary also came among them to present himself before the LORD. The LORD said to the Adversary, "Where have you come from?"

The Adversary answered the LORD, "From wandering throughout the earth."

The LORD said to the Adversary, "Have you thought about my servant Job, for there is no one like him on earth, a man who is honest, who is of absolute integrity, who reveres God and avoids evil? He still holds on to his integrity, even though you incited me to ruin him for no reason."

The Adversary responded to the LORD, "Skin for skin—people will give up everything they have in exchange for their lives. But stretch out your hand and strike his bones and flesh. Then he will definitely curse you to your face."

The LORD answered the Adversary, "There he is—within your power; only preserve his life."

The Adversary departed from the LORD's presence and struck Job with severe sores from the sole of his foot to the top of his head. Job took a piece of broken pottery to scratch himself and sat down on a mound of ashes.

Job's wife said to him, "Are you still clinging to your integrity? Curse God, and die."

Job said to her, "You're talking like a foolish woman. Will we receive good from God but not also receive bad?" In all this, Job didn't sin with his lips.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

In the past, God spoke through the prophets to our ancestors in many times and many ways. In these final days, though, he spoke to us through a Son. God made his Son the heir of everything and created the world through him. The Son is the light of God's glory and the imprint of God's being. He maintains everything with his powerful message. After he carried out the cleansing of people from their sins, he sat down at the right side of the highest majesty. And the Son became so much greater than the other messengers, such as angels, that he received a more important title than theirs.

[...]

God didn't put the world that is coming (the world we are talking about) under the angels' control. Instead, someone declared somewhere,

What is humanity that you think about them?

Or what is the human being that you care about them? For a while you made them lower than angels.

You crowned the human being with glory and honour.

You put everything under their control.

When he puts everything under their control, he doesn't leave anything out of control. But right now, we don't see everything under their control yet. However, we do see the one who was made lower in order than the angels for a little while—it's Jesus! He's the one who is now crowned with glory and honour because of the suffering of his death. He suffered death so that he could taste death for everyone through God's grace.

It was appropriate for God, for whom and through whom everything exists, to use experiences of suffering to make perfect the pioneer of salvation. This salvation belongs to many sons and daughters whom he's leading to glory. This is because the one who makes people holy and the people who are being made holy all come from one source. That is why Jesus isn't ashamed to call them brothers and sisters when he says,

I will publicly announce your name

to my brothers and sisters.

*I will praise you in the middle of the assembly.*

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

Jesus left that place and went beyond the Jordan and into the region of Judea. Crowds gathered around him again and, as usual, he taught them.

People were bringing children to Jesus so that he would bless them. But the disciples scolded them.


