As always, this is a time for each of us to be considering who might be nominated to serve on Parish Council, as churchwardens, and as members of the Incumbency Committee.

For churchwardens and members of Parish Council, we are looking for people who are:

- Committed to the life and flourishing of our parish
- Willing to work with others in discerning the leading of the Holy Spirit
- Seeking to grow in faith and understanding
- Able to attend a monthly meeting (on Zoom) as well as working proactively with others on particular projects

Could this be you? Or is there someone you would like to nominate? Please do give some thought and prayer to this question, as it is the responsibility of the whole parish to elect a Parish Council that is well equipped to do its work. If you have any sense that this might be you, please feel free to talk further with any current member of Parish Council or with me. Nomination forms are available now on the parish website.

Talking of church governance and annual meetings, this week is our diocesan Synod—in a sense the "annual meeting" of the whole diocese. Some months ago a decision was made to hold this meeting online—with around 600 participants, this is a considerably more challenging undertaking than our parish meeting! Quite apart from the technological aspects, there are—as always—matters of substance and significance to be discussed, including a long-overdue revision of the process for electing an archbishop. So please do pray for these Synod meetings, and for our parish Synod representatives Sandra Hansen and Anna Watts, who will participating along with Rev'd Kathryn and myself.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Job

Job answered:

Today my complaint is again bitter; my strength is weighed down because of my groaning.

Oh, that I could know how to find him—come to his dwelling place;

I would lay out my case before him, fill my mouth with arguments,

know the words with which he would answer, understand what he would say to me.

Would he contend with me through brute force? No, he would surely listen to me.

There those who do the right thing can argue with him;

I could escape from my judge forever.

Look, I go east; he's not there,

west, and don't discover him;

north in his activity, and I don't grasp him;

he turns south, and I don't see.

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God has weakened my mind;

the Almighty has frightened me.

Still I'm not annihilated by darkness;

he has hidden deep darkness from me.

PSALM

To you they cried and they were saved: they put their trust in you and were not confounded.

But as for me, I am a worm and no man: the scorn of all and despised by the people.

But you are he that took me out of the womb: that brought me to lie at peace on my mother's breast.

On you have I been cast since my birth: you are my God, even from my mother's womb.

O go not from me, for trouble is hard at hand: and there is none to help.

Many oxen surround me: fat bulls of Bashan close me in on every side.

They gape wide their mouths at me: like lions that roar and rend.

I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint: my heart within my breast is like melting wax.

My mouth is dried up like a potsherd: and my tongue clings to my gums.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

God's word is living, active, and sharper than any two-edged sword. It penetrates to the point that it separates the soul from the spirit and the joints from the marrow. It's able to judge the heart's thoughts and intentions. No creature is hidden from it, but rather everything is naked and exposed to the eyes of the one to whom we have to give an answer.

Also, let's hold on to the confession since we have a great high priest who passed through the heavens, who is Jesus, God's Son; because we don't have a high priest who can't sympathize with our weaknesses but instead one who was tempted in every way that we are, except without sin.

Finally, let's draw near to the throne of favour with confidence so that we can receive mercy and find grace when we need help.

THE GOSPEL

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark

As Jesus continued down the road, a man ran up, knelt before him, and asked, "Good Teacher, what must I do to obtain eternal life?"

Jesus replied, "Why do you call me good? No one is good except the one God. You know the commandments: Don't commit murder. Don't commit adultery. Don't steal. Don't give false testimony. Don't cheat. Honour your father and mother."

"Teacher," he responded, "I've kept all of these things since I was a boy."

Jesus looked at him carefully and loved him. He said, "You are lacking one thing. Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor. Then you will have treasure in heaven. And come, follow me." But the man was dismayed at this statement and went away saddened, because he had many possessions.

Looking around, Jesus said to his disciples, "It will be very hard for the wealthy to enter God's kingdom!" His words startled the disciples, so Jesus told them again, "Children, it's difficult to enter God's kingdom! It's easier for a camel to squeeze through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter God's kingdom."

They were shocked even more and said to each other, "Then who can be saved?"

Jesus looked at them carefully and said, "It's impossible with human beings, but not with God. All things are possible for God."

Peter said to him, "Look, we've left everything and followed you."

Jesus said, "I assure you that anyone who has left house, brothers, sisters, mother, father, children, or farms because of me and because of the good news will receive one hundred times as much now in this life—houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children, and farms (with harassment)—and in the coming age, eternal life. But many who are first will be last. And many who are last will be first."
