

Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

For you alone are the Holy One, vou alone are the Lord. you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

God of compassion, keep before us the love you have revealed in your Son, who prayed even for his enemies. In our words and deeds help us to be like him, through whom we pray, Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. **Amen.**

Opening the Scriptures

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

At the greeting of peace, we recognise that God's gift of peace constantly renews our human relationships and forms us as the Body of Christ.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book Genesis.

Joseph said to his brothers, "I'm Joseph! Is my father really still alive?" His brothers couldn't respond because they were terrified before him.

Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me," and they moved closer. He said, "I'm your brother Joseph! The one you sold to Egypt. Now, don't be upset and don't be angry with yourselves that you sold me here. Actually, God sent me before you to save lives. We've already had two years of famine in the land, and there are five years left without planting or harvesting. God sent me before you to make sure you'd survive and to rescue your lives in this amazing way. You didn't send me here; it was God who made me a father to Pharaoh, master of his entire household, and ruler of the whole land of Egypt.

"Hurry! Go back to your father. Tell him this is what your son Joseph says: 'God has made me master of all of Egypt. Come down to me. Don't delay. You may live in the land of Goshen, so you will be near me, your children, your grandchildren, your flocks, your herds, and everyone with you. I will support you there, so you, your household, and everyone with you won't starve, since the famine will still last five years.' [...]

He kissed all of his brothers and wept, embracing them. After that, his brothers were finally able to talk to him.

We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

The reunion of long-separated loved ones is a familiar theme in literature and films. They are moments full of emotion, sometimes after many years of wondering whether there would ever be such a meeting again.

The reunion described in our first reading today has an extra twist—the reason that Joseph was separated from his brothers in the first place was that they wanted to get rid of him. They were jealous of his dreams of greatness and the preferential treatment that he received from their father, and when an opportunity came they seized him and planned to kill him, but then ended up selling him to some passing slave traders.

The whole story takes up about half of Genesis, the first book of the Bible, and has all sorts of twists and turns, deceptions and providences. Many years after Joseph is sold into slavery, he ends up rising to be the most powerful man in Egypt under Pharoah. His brothers, meanwhile, are suffering desperate food shortages and come to Egypt seeking assistance, completely unaware that it is Joseph himself who has authority to decide whether to give them much-needed food supplies. In today's reading we come to the moment where Joseph reveals his identity to them.

What a moment! What will happen? Will he choose to get his own back? No, he chooses to be generous to them, and even to recognise the good in all that he has gone through as a result of their evil actions all those years ago.

Of course, these key moments happen in our own time too. When there is a change of power in nations (whether or not by democratic process), will the newly powerful choose to go for payback, or will they act with generosity, for the common good?

Perhaps there have been times in your life when you have faced a similar choice—whether to act in a way that reinforces existing divisions and grievances, or to use the present moment as an opportunity for a fresh start.

The story of Joseph has plenty more to it that this short reading, and by no means all of Joseph's actions are honourable and just. But this particular moment of reconciliation holds something of a glimpse of God's goodness, as relationship is restored, power is used for good rather than evil, and Joseph's brothers are "finally able to talk to him."
