

# EASTER

The Great Fifty Days of Eastertide form a single festival period: seven weeks in which the Church celebrates the risen Christ with wonder, love and praise.

After the starker, penitential liturgies of Lent and Holy Week, Easter arrives with a burst of light and joy. We proclaim the resurrection in our liturgical greeting ("Christ is risen...") and in the repeated *Alleluia* acclamation. The Easter (Paschal) Candle burns prominently in our midst throughout this season, and the liturgical colour is festive white, emphasising the light and brightness of the resurrection.

Easter is closely associated with our baptism, our own passing over into life in Christ: "when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead." (Colossians 2.12) The liturgies of the Easter Vigil and of Easter Day include a renewal of our baptismal promises, and throughout this season we say the Apostles' Creed, the baptismal statement of faith. The baptism font stands prominently in our midst, as the foundational place of forgiveness, of release into the freedom of the children of God.

So Easter recalls us to the identity in the risen Christ which is ours both individually and as the Church, the Body of Christ. We are the people who have proclaimed "I turn to Christ"; we are the people who have passed through the water and emerged into a place of new beginning and new life.

Since the late fourth century, the fortieth day of Easter has been a particular celebration of Christ's ascension. Jesus commissions his disciples to continue his work, he promises the gift of the Holy Spirit, and then he is no longer among them in the flesh. The ascension is therefore closely connected with the theme of mission. The arrival of the promised gift of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost (the fiftieth day) completes and crowns the Easter Festival.

The power of the Creator who brings life out of death, be in this place.

The risen Christ be your constant companion.

The healing embrace of the Holy Spirit encircle you so that you see resurrection ever about you.

# **Opening the Scriptures**

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

#### FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

A vision of a man from Macedonia came to Paul during the night. He stood urging Paul, "Come over to Macedonia and help us!" Immediately after he saw the vision, we prepared to leave for the province of Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We sailed from Troas straight for Samothrace and came to Neapolis the following day. From there we went to Philippi, a city of Macedonia's first district and a Roman colony. We stayed in that city several days. On the Sabbath we went outside the city gate to the riverbank, where we thought there might be a place for prayer. We sat down and began to talk with the women who had gathered. One of those women was Lydia, a Gentile God-worshipper from the city of Thyatira, a dealer in purple cloth. As she listened, the Lord enabled her to embrace Paul's message. Once she and her household were baptized, she urged, "Now that you have decided that I am a believer in the Lord, come and stay in my house." And she persuaded us.

#### SECOND READING

A reading from the Revelation to John of Patmos.

The angel took me in a Spirit-inspired trance to a great, high mountain, and he showed me the holy city, Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God. The city had God's glory. Its brilliance was like a priceless jewel, like jasper that was as clear as crystal. It had a great high wall with twelve gates. By the gates were twelve angels, and on the gates were written the names of the twelve tribes of Israel's sons. There were three gates on the east, three gates on the north, three gates on the south, and three gates on the west. The city wall had twelve foundations, and on them were the twelve names of the Lamb's twelve apostles. [...]

I didn't see a temple in the city, because its temple is the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb. The city doesn't need the sun or the moon to shine on it, because God's glory is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day, and there will be no night there. They will bring the glory and honour of the nations into it. Nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does what is vile and deceitful, but only those who are registered in the Lamb's scroll of life.

Then the angel showed me the river of life-giving water, shining like crystal, flowing from the throne of God and the Lamb through the middle of the city's main street. On each side of the river is the tree of life, which produces twelve crops of fruit, bearing its fruit each month. The tree's leaves are for the healing of the nations. There will no longer be any curse. The throne of God and the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him. They will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. Night will be no more. They won't need the light of a lamp or the light of the sun, for the Lord God will shine on them, and they will rule forever and always.

# Celebrating at the Lord's table

Our offerings of money and groceries remind us that we are called to participate with our lives and livelihoods in the coming of God's kingdom of justice, healing and peace.

In the Great Thanksgiving, the priest voices the prayer of the whole assembly, recalling the mighty acts of God, Jesus' saving death and resurrection, and his last meal with his friends. The prayer calls on the Holy Spirit to make Christ present in our sharing of bread and wine, and to remake us as Christ's body in the world. We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

The Last Supper is recalled, including Jesus' command to continue sharing bread and wine: in memory of him, and proclaiming his death and resurrection. All respond:

...we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

The prayer calls on God's blessing and looks to the fulfilling of all things within the goodness of God, and concludes:

...all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.

Amen.

# SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear fellow pilgrim,

This Thursday is the Feast of the Ascension. This Holy Day, coming forty days after Easter, is always on a Thursday, so it's easy to miss! But at it we celebrate one of the most distinctive and wonderful elements of the Christian faith...

At Ascension the church marks the day the apostles followed the Risen Lord into the olive-laden hills outside Jerusalem, to Bethany, where they watched him ascend into the sky, his glorified body vanishing into a cloud. The evangelist St Luke, who also wrote Acts, tells us twice:

And it came to pass, while he blessed them, he was parted from them, and carried up into heaven. (Luke 24.51)

And when he had spoken these things, while they beheld, he was taken up; and a cloud received him out of their sight. (Acts 1.9)

It is told so suddenly and briefly you can almost miss it. But it is full of significance. The eternal Word who came to meet us, being born of Mary, named 'Jesus', *Saviour*, and giving his body to be broken at Calvary, has taken that human body, redeemed and glorified, into the 'place' beyond all times, and all places. That is, into God. At the Father's right hand stands Christ *in the fullness of his humanity*.

Karl Rahner, a Catholic theologian, says of the Ascension of Jesus:

"...my faith and my consolation are centered on this: that he[, Christ,] has taken with him everything that is ours. He has ascended and he sits at the right hand of the Father... The absolute Logos shall look at me in eternity with the face of a man."

In the meantime, the mystery of the church is this—that we who are many, are not any old body. We are his body. By the graces of the Spirit and the sacrament, the Risen Lord lives in us. I am his heart, his ears, you are his eyes, his right hand, his lungs. *Christ has no feet on earth but yours (St Theresa of Avila).* This earthly body of Jesus is called to share in the glory into which he has entered. She is called to be, for ever and ever, near to the 'side', the heart of the Holy God, Sovereign of all things, like a sacred council surrounding his throne.

How far our poor old church is from being ready for what God has prepared for us! As you move through the world this week, pray for the church, that she be made worthy of her calling.

Pray for every heart and mind in our parish, that more and more we learn to *love* this body that we belong to, in all its members.

And, if you can, come celebrate the Ascension... Thursday 10am, Eucharist for the Feast of the Ascension, St Eanswythe's

#### **COVID** restrictions

As we know, COVID (and now flu as well) is still very much present in our community, and the diocese continues to support current health advice: to maintain good hygiene and care, use sanitiser, and not to attend if you have any symptoms.

# A call to prayer...

After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered with Mary, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Like them, our reliance on the gift of the Holy Spirit is total – on our own we can do nothing.

Through the centuries Christians have gathered at that time to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Over the past three years more and more worshipping communities, around the world, have dedicated the days between Ascension and Pentecost to pray 'Come Holy Spirit', in a movement of prayer called *Thy Kinadom Come*.

In our parish, this waiting on God in prayer will be a particular focus of our weekday services during those days between Ascension and Pentecost. Do come along if can, or join from home in praying for that the Spirit will inspire and equip us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with our friends and families, our communities and networks.

This year, these days also coincide with the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation (27 May to 3 June), calling us to pray for justice, reconciliation and healing in the relationships between settlers and First Nations people of this land.

od of holy dreaming, Great Creator Spirit, I from the dawn of creation you have given your children the good things of Mother Earth. You spoke and the gum tree grew. In the vast desert and dense forest, and in cities at the water's edge, creation sings your praise. Your presence endures as the rock at the heart of our Land. When Jesus hung on the tree you heard the cries of all your people and became one with your wounded ones: the convicts, the hunted, and the dispossessed. The sunrise of your Son coloured the earth anew, and bathed it in glorious hope. In Jesus we have been reconciled to you, to each other and to your whole creation. Lead us on, Great Spirit, as we gather from the four corners of the earth; enable us to walk together in trust from the hurt and shame of the past into the full day which has dawned in Jesus Christ. Amen.
