Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' Jesus said: 'This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, confident in God's forgiveness. Merciful God, our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, and in what we have failed to do:

we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent, and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us.

Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all who turn to him in faith: pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

GLORIA

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father. Lord God, Lamb of God. you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; vou are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ. with the Holy Spirit. in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Pour out upon us, O God, the power and wisdom of your Spirit, so that we, who have been baptised into Christ and made your children through faith, may know your Son's power to heal, and, being made one in him, may overcome all barriers that divide us; through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Opening the Scriptures

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Kings.

Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, how he had killed all Baal's prophets with the sword. Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah with this message: "May the gods do whatever they want to me if by this time tomorrow I haven't made your life like the life of one of them."

Elijah was terrified. He got up and ran for his life. He arrived at Beer-sheba in Judah and left his assistant there. He himself went farther on into the desert a day's journey. He finally sat down under a solitary broom bush. He longed for his own death: "It's more than enough, Lord! Take my life because I'm no better than my ancestors."

[...]

Elijah got up, ate and drank, and went refreshed by that food for forty days and nights until he arrived at Horeb, God's mountain. There he went into a cave and spent the night.

The Lord's word came to him and said, "Why are you here, Elijah?"

Elijah replied, "I've been very passionate for the Lord God of heavenly forces because the Israelites have abandoned your covenant. They have torn down your altars, and they have murdered your prophets with the sword. I'm the only one left, and now they want to take my life too!"

The Lord said, "Go out and stand at the mountain before the Lord. The Lord is passing by." A very strong wind tore through the mountains and broke apart the stones before the Lord. But the Lord wasn't in the wind. After the wind, there was an earthquake. But the Lord wasn't in the earthquake. After the earthquake, there was a fire. But the Lord wasn't in the fire. After the fire, there was a sound. Thin. Quiet. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his coat. He went out and stood at the cave's entrance. A voice came to him and said, "Why are you here, Elijah?"

He said, "I've been very passionate for the Lord God of heavenly forces because the Israelites have abandoned your covenant. They have torn down your altars, and they have murdered your prophets with the sword. I'm the only one left, and now they want to take my life too."

The Lord said to him, "Go back through the desert to Damascus and anoint Hazael as king of Aram.

(19.1-4, 8-15a; CEB)

Thanks be to God.

As a deer longs for the running brooks: so longs my soul for you, O God.

My soul is thirsty for God, thirsty for the living God: when shall I come and see his face?

My tears have been my food day and night: while they ask me all day long 'Where now is your God?'

As I pour out my soul by myself, I remember this: how I went to the house of the Mighty One, into the temple of God,

To the shouts and songs of thanksgiving: a multitude keeping high festival.

Why are you so full of heaviness, my soul: and why so unquiet within me? O put your trust in God: for I will praise him yet, who is my deliverer and my God.

My soul is heavy within me: therefore I will remember you from the land of Jordan, from Mizar among the hills of Hermon.

Deep calls to deep in the roar of your waters: all your waves and breakers have gone over me.

Surely the Lord will grant his loving mercy in the day-time: and in the night his song will be with me, a prayer to the God of my life.

I will say to God, my rock, 'Why have you forgotten me: why must I go like a mourner because the enemy oppresses me?'

Like a sword through my bones, my enemies have mocked me: while they ask me all day long 'Where now is your God?'

Why are you so full of heaviness, my soul: and why so unquiet within me?

O put your trust in God: for I will praise him yet, who is my deliverer and my God.

Give judgement for me, O God, take up my cause against an ungodly people: deliver me from the deceitful and unjust.

For you are God my refuge—why have you turned me away: why must I go like a mourner because the enemy oppresses me?

O send out your light and your truth, and let them lead me: let them guide me to your holy hill and to your dwelling.

Then I shall go to the altar of God, to God my joy and my delight: and to the harp I shall sing your praises, O God, my God.

O put your trust in God: for I will praise him yet, who is my deliverer and my God.

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Galatians.

All those who rely on the works of the Law are under a curse, because it is written, Everyone is cursed who does not keep on doing all the things that have been written in the Law scroll. But since no one is made righteous by the Law as far as God is concerned, it is clear that the righteous one will live on the basis of faith. The Law isn't based on faith; rather, the one doing these things will live by them. Christ

redeemed us from the curse of the Law by becoming a curse for us—because it is written, Everyone who is hung on a tree is cursed. He redeemed us so that the blessing of Abraham would come to the Gentiles through Christ Jesus, and that we would receive the promise of the Spirit through faith.

THE GOSPEL

Alleluia. Alleluia.

I am the light of the world, says the Lord. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life. **Alleluia.**

A reading from the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus and his disciples sailed to the Gerasenes' land, which is across the lake from Galilee. As soon as Jesus got out of the boat, a certain man met him. The man was from the city and was possessed by demons. For a long time, he had lived among the tombs, naked and homeless. When he saw Jesus, he shrieked and fell down before him. Then he shouted, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, don't torture me!" He said this because Jesus had already commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. Many times it had taken possession of him, so he would be bound with leg irons and chains and placed under guard. But he would break his restraints, and the demon would force him into the wilderness.

Jesus asked him, "What is your name?"

"Legion," he replied, because many demons had entered him. They pleaded with him not to order them to go back into the abyss. A large herd of pigs was feeding on the hillside. The demons begged Jesus to let them go into the pigs. Jesus gave them permission, and the demons left the man and entered the pigs. The herd rushed down the cliff into the lake and drowned.

When those who tended the pigs saw what happened, they ran away and told the story in the city and in the countryside. People came to see what had happened. They came to Jesus and found the man from whom the demons had gone. He was sitting at Jesus' feet, fully dressed and completely sane. They were filled with awe. Those people who had actually seen what had happened told them how the demon-possessed man had been delivered. Then everyone gathered from the region of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave their area because they were overcome with fear. So he got into the boat and returned across the lake. The man from whom the demons had gone begged to come along with Jesus as one of his disciples. Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return home and tell the story of what God has done for you." So he went throughout the city proclaiming what Jesus had done for him.

SERMON

NICENE CREED

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church: We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light. true God from true God. begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Everyone is invited to turn to those around, and offer a greeting of peace from where you stand.

Offerings of money or groceries can be placed in the basket/box provided.

Celebrating at the Lord's table

Our offerings of money and groceries remind us that we are called to participate with our lives and livelihoods in the coming of God's kingdom of justice, healing and peace.

In the Great Thanksgiving, the priest voices the prayer of the whole assembly, recalling the mighty acts of God, Jesus' saving death and resurrection, and his last meal with his friends. The prayer calls on the Holy Spirit to make Christ present in our sharing of bread and wine, and to remake us as Christ's body in the world. We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

The priest breaks the bread and says

The gifts of God for the people of God.

This is the Lord's table. All who seek God's mercy are welcome.

Everyone is invited to share communion or to receive a personal blessing. Children who have been baptised are welcome to share communion. All the communion bread will have wine added to it, but if you also wish to drink from the common cup then please remain and it will be brought to you. If you would prefer not to share communion but to receive a personal blessing, please indicate when the priest comes to you.

While communion is being shared, we sing:

SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear fellow pilgrims,

I write to you on the feast of Corpus Christi, when the church gives thanks for the gift of the Holy Eucharist. It is with some irony that I write from isolation, on a day when I would otherwise have been with the Thursday crew at St Eanswythe's to celebrate the Eucharist! So it goes...

In the history of the church it is often people who live with illness, their own or others', who have appreciated most keenly the holy sacrament. The person who first advocated for the institution of this feast, Juliana, lived in a convent in Norway that was joined with a leprosarium, which is, as it sounds, a place for people with leprosy to live. In medieval Europe they were often established alongside monasteries and convents so that the monks or nuns could care for the residents next door. Sister Juliana had been raised in the convent, so since she was five years old, she had lived alongside people with leprosy, with this painful contagious skin disease that compromised so many of their hopes for life. I wonder if Juliana's life alongside such companions helped her appreciate how amazing it is that Christ, so holy, so divine, should choose to give us the sacrament that he might enter our lives, and indeed our mortal bodies, however weak or diseased they should be. By this grace he accepts them, and sanctifies them, and prepares us for glory.

In the modern Anglican tradition where places of worship have been established that hold the Holy Eucharist in particular reverence, they have often been established alongside places to welcome and serve vulnerable members of the wider community.

'You cannot claim to worship Jesus in the tabernacle if you do not pity Jesus in the slum', one Bishop Weston of Zanzibar once famously said. The 'tabernacle' is a place where the reserved sacrament is kept, a *constant* living sign of Christ's presence with his people. In our tradition, a particular purpose of reserving the sacrament is to share it with those who are sick or otherwise unable to attend the Eucharist in person. At St Eanswythe's we have a place in the lady chapel set apart for that purpose, and take it to share particularly with the residents of nursing homes in our area—a fact which is well worth reflecting on. When we come to the Eucharist of a Sunday, we are together celebrants of the feast. Everyone who *is* present is making it possible for those who are absent to share in the holy food, and strengthen their connection with the One who gave his body to make us one, and to make us holy.

How much I'm looking forward to seeing everyone, and celebrating the Eucharist with you all again!
