Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

Let us pray.

to whom all hearts are open,
all desires known,
and from whom no secrets are hidden:
cleanse the thoughts of our hearts
by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit,
that we may perfectly love you,
and worthily magnify your holy name,
through Christ our Lord. Amen.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' Jesus said: 'This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, confident in God's forgiveness. Merciful God, our maker and our judge, we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, and in what we have failed to do:

we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent, and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us.

Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all who turn to him in faith: pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

GLORIA

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father. Lord God, Lamb of God. you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; vou are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ. with the Holy Spirit. in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Eternal God, you have taught us through Christ that love is the fulfilment of the law: help us to love you with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our mind, and with all our strength, and our neighbour as ourself; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Amen.

Opening the Scriptures

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Amos.

This is what the Lord showed me: The Lord was standing by a wall, with a plumb line in his hand. The Lord said to me, "Amos, what do you see?"

"A plumb line," I said.

Then the Lord said,

"See, I am setting a plumb line

in the middle of my people Israel.

I will never again forgive them.

The shrines of Isaac will be made desolate,

and the holy places of Israel will be laid waste,

and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, reported to Israel's King Jeroboam, "Amos has plotted against you within the house of Israel. The land isn't able to cope with everything that he is saying. Amos has said, 'Jeroboam will die by the sword, and Israel will be forced out of its land."

Amaziah said to Amos, "You who see things, go, run away to the land of Judah, eat your bread there, and prophesy there; but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's holy place and his royal house."

Amos answered Amaziah, "I am not a prophet, nor am I a prophet's son; but I am a shepherd, and a trimmer of sycamore trees. But the Lord took me from shepherding the flock, and the Lord said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'

"Now then hear the Lord's word.

You say, 'Don't prophesy against Israel,

and don't preach

against the house of Isaac.'

"Therefore, the Lord proclaims:

'Your wife will become a prostitute in the city,

and your sons and your daughters will fall by the sword,

and your land will be measured and divided up;

you yourself will die in an unclean land,

and Israel will surely be taken away from its land."

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Colossians.

From Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by God's will, and Timothy our brother.

To the holy and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae.

Grace and peace to you from God our Father.

We always give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you. We've done this since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and your love for all God's people. You have this faith and love because of the hope reserved for you in heaven. You previously heard about this hope through the true message, the good news, which has come to you. This message has been bearing fruit and growing among you since the day you heard and truly understood God's grace, in the same way that it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world. You learned it from Epaphras, who is the fellow slave we love and Christ's faithful minister for your sake. He informed us of your love in the Spirit.

Because of this, since the day we heard about you, we haven't stopped praying for you and asking for you to be filled with the knowledge of God's will, with all wisdom and spiritual understanding. We're praying this so that you can live lives that are worthy of the Lord and pleasing to him in every way: by producing fruit in every good work and growing in the knowledge of God; by being strengthened through his glorious might so that you endure everything and have patience; and by giving thanks with joy to the Father. He made it so you could take part in the inheritance, in light granted to God's holy people. He rescued us from the control of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of the Son he loves. He set us free through the Son and forgave our sins.


Then the legal expert said, "The one who demonstrated mercy toward him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

SERMON



NICENE CREED

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church: We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. eternally begotten of the Father. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Celebrating at the Lord's table

Our offerings of money and groceries remind us that we are called to participate with our lives and livelihoods in the coming of God's kingdom of justice, healing and peace.

In the Great Thanksgiving, the priest voices the prayer of the whole assembly, recalling the mighty acts of God, Jesus' saving death and resurrection, and his last meal with his friends. The prayer calls on the Holy Spirit to make Christ present in our sharing of bread and wine, and to remake us as Christ's body in the world. We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

This is the Lord's table. All who seek God's mercy are welcome.

Everyone is invited to share communion or to receive a personal blessing. Children who have been baptised are welcome to share communion. All the communion bread will have wine added to it, but if you also wish to drink from the common cup then please remain and it will be brought to you. If you would prefer not to share communion but to receive a personal blessing, please indicate when the priest comes to you.

While communion is being shared, we sing:

Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me. Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me. Break me, melt me, mould me, fill me. Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on me.

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Going into the world

The Eucharist is food for the journey of faith, whatever awaits us as we go out to the rest of our lives. We have been renewed, transformed, and blessed: now we take that blessing to share with others, in our words and actions, our hearts and lives.

SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Being a part of God's Family, the church, is vitally important to us all.

For many of us, if not most of us, our family of origin is also of vital importance to us.

Weddings and changing surnames, which once were a "given" are not the "norm" these days resulting in families pondering the question of identity – where have we come from in our ancestorial heritage? What will be the surname children will carry from such a marriage? Will the "family name" be carried on to a future generation – or lost forever?

Identity! We humans appear to have to know our ancestorial roots and heritage in order to feel we have a "place" in our families and in our world. This is something which I have observed in most, not all, but most people I have known. We want to know something about where our great, great grandparents came from, what vocations they had, what sort of person they were, etc.

Occasionally, I have Officiated at the funeral of a person whose family have, it appeared, hardly known them. I have felt this was terribly sad for the person who has died and terribly sad for the family.

Not so long ago, I read that the current Archbishop of Canterbury had been questioned about the identity of his father. His answer was that he: "found his identity in Christ"!

This is a truth which binds all Christians together in the family of God.

Whatever our ancestorial heritage is, and this is important to us in order that we know our place in our family of origin - we are all God's sons and daughters through adoption into God's family, the church. St. Paul, in his letter to the Galatians, says: "My point is this: heirs, as long as they are minors, are no better than slaves, though they are the owners of all the property; but they remain under guardians and trustees until the date set by the father. So with us; while we were minors, we were enslaved to the elemental spirits of the world. But when the fullness of time had come, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under the law, in order to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as children. And because you are children, God has sent the Spirit of His Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" So you are no longer a slave but a child, and if a child then also an heir, through God." (Galatians 4:1-7)

This really is wonderful "good news" for us all.

This portrait of the wounded man (see the bandage?) being lifted by the Samaritan onto his horse, was painted by Vincent van Gogh in the summer of 1889-90.

At the time Van Gogh was Не asylum. himself in, in May 1889.

staying in a psychiatric asylum in the south of France. The prior autumn his psychological state reached a point where it was too difficult for him to live, as he had been, independently in a town called Arles; he relied on the help of a few people also living in the town to make his way to the checked The place used to be a monastery. While staying there, he had access to



some art books, and was drawn to a number of paintings of the Good Samaritan scene—in particular, he seems to have modelled his own painting on one by the painter Delacroix ('The Good Samaritan' 1849—see the little image on the front of the pew sheet).

Interestingly, while Delacroix who the one was reasonably healthy, travelling and living off independent means when he painted the scene (I think they call this "kicking goals" in life), his painting is a great balance of light and dark, and there is plenty of dark in it; whereas in the painting of van Gogh it's all colour overwhelming colour, and vibrancy, and light.
