Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

Let us pray.

to whom all hearts are open,
all desires known,
and from whom no secrets are hidden:
cleanse the thoughts of our hearts
by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit,
that we may perfectly love you,
and worthily magnify your holy name,
through Christ our Lord. Amen.

CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.' Jesus said: 'This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, confident in God's forgiveness.

Merciful God,

our maker and our judge,

we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
and in what we have failed to do:

we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves; we repent, and are sorry for all our sins. Father, forgive us.

Strengthen us to love and obey you in newness of life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Almighty God, who has promised forgiveness to all who turn to him in faith: pardon you and set you free from all your sins, strengthen you in all goodness and keep you in eternal life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

GLORIA

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to God's people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father. Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One. you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High Jesus Christ. with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Ever-living God, increase in us your gift of faith, that, forsaking sin and all that hinders us, we may run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

Amen.

Opening the Scriptures

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

Let me sing for my loved one a love song for his vineyard.

My loved one had a vineyard on a fertile hillside.

He dug it,

cleared away its stones,

planted it with excellent vines,

built a tower inside it,

and dug out a wine vat in it.

He expected it to grow good grapes—

but it grew rotten grapes.

So now, you who live in Jerusalem, you people of Judah,

judge between me and my vineyard:

What more was there to do for my vineyard

that I haven't done for it?

When I expected it to grow good grapes,

why did it grow rotten grapes?

Now let me tell you what I'm doing to my vineyard.

I'm removing its hedge,

so it will be destroyed.

I'm breaking down its walls,

so it will be trampled.

I'll turn it into a ruin;

it won't be pruned or hoed,

and thorns and thistles will grow up.

I will command the clouds not to rain on it.

The vineyard of the LORD of heavenly forces is the house of Israel, and the people of Judah are the plantings in which God delighted.

God expected justice, but there was bloodshed;

righteousness, but there was a cry of distress!

(5.1-7; CEB)

Hear the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

PSALM

Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, you that led Joseph like a flock: you that are enthroned upon the cherubim, shine out in glory;

Before Ephraim, Benjamin and Manasseh: stir up your power, and come to save us.

You brought a vine out of Egypt: you drove out the nations, and planted it in.

You cleared the ground before it: and it struck root and filled the land.

The hills were covered with its shadow: and its boughs were like the boughs of the great cedars.

It stretched out its branches to the sea: and its tender shoots to the Great River.

Why then have you broken down its walls: so that every passer-by can pluck its fruit?

The wild boar out of the woods roots it up: and the locusts from the wild places devour it.

Turn to us again, O Lord of hosts: look down from heaven, and see.

Bestow your care upon this vine: the stock which your own right hand has planted.

As for those that burn it with fire and cut it down: let them perish at the rebuke of your countenance.

Let your power rest on the man at your right hand: on that son of man, whom you made so strong for yourself.

And so we shall not turn back from you: give us life, and we will call upon your name.

Restore us again, O Lord of hosts: show us the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

(80.1-2, 8-19)

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

By faith the people crossed the Red Sea as if they were on dry land, but when the Egyptians tried it, they were drowned.

By faith Jericho's walls fell after the people marched around them for seven days.

By faith Rahab the prostitute wasn't killed with the disobedient because she welcomed the spies in peace.

What more can I say? I would run out of time if I told you about Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel, and the prophets. Through faith they conquered kingdoms, brought about justice, realized promises, shut the mouths of lions, put out raging fires, escaped from the edge of the sword, found strength in weakness, were mighty in war, and routed foreign armies. Women received back their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured and refused to be released so they could gain a better resurrection.

But others experienced public shame by being taunted and whipped; they were even put in chains and in prison. They were stoned to death, they were cut in two, and they died by being murdered with swords. They went around wearing the skins of

sheep and goats, needy, oppressed, and mistreated. The world didn't deserve them. They wandered around in deserts, mountains, caves, and holes in the ground.

All these people didn't receive what was promised, though they were given approval for their faith. God provided something better for us so they wouldn't be made perfect without us.

So then, with endurance, let's also run the race that is laid out in front of us, since we have such a great cloud of witnesses surrounding us. Let's throw off any extra baggage, get rid of the sin that trips us up, and fix our eyes on Jesus, faith's pioneer and perfecter. He endured the cross, ignoring the shame, for the sake of the joy that was laid out in front of him, and sat down at the right side of God's throne.

(11.29-12.2; CEB)

[Jesus said:] "I came to cast fire upon the earth. How I wish that it was already ablaze! I have a baptism I must experience. How I am distressed until it's completed! Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, I have come instead to bring division. From now on, a household of five will be divided—three against two and two against three. Father will square off against son and son against father; mother against daughter and daughter against mother; and mother-in-law against daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."

Jesus also said to the crowds, "When you see a cloud forming in the west, you immediately say, 'It's going to rain.' And indeed it does. And when a south wind blows, you say, 'A heat wave is coming.' And it does. Hypocrites! You know how to interpret conditions on earth and in the sky. How is it that you don't know how to interpret the present time? And why don't you judge for yourselves what is right? As you are going to court with your accuser, make your best effort to reach a settlement along the way. Otherwise, your accuser may bring you before the judge, and the judge hand you over to the officer, and the officer throw you into prison. I tell you, you won't get out of there until you have paid the very last cent."

NICENE CREED

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church: We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God. eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. Offerings of money or groceries can be placed in the basket/box provided.

Celebrating at the Lord's table

Our offerings of money and groceries remind us that we are called to participate with our lives and livelihoods in the coming of God's kingdom of justice, healing and peace.

In the Great Thanksgiving, the priest voices the prayer of the whole assembly, recalling the mighty acts of God, Jesus' saving death and resurrection, and his last meal with his friends. The prayer calls on the Holy Spirit to make Christ present in our sharing of bread and wine, and to remake us as Christ's body in the world. We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

Everyone is invited to share communion or to receive a personal blessing. Children who have been baptised are welcome to share communion. All the communion bread will have wine added to it, but if you also wish to drink from the common cup then please remain and it will be brought to you. If you would prefer not to share communion but to receive a personal blessing, please indicate when the priest comes to you.

SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear friends,

It is good to be back with you all! I do particularly thank Rev'd Kathryn and Rev'd Gail for their ministry during these last eight weeks, enabling our family to have this much-needed period of long service leave.

During that time we have appreciated the opportunity to worship in different churches each week, both interstate and here in Melbourne—some Anglican, and some other denominations. As visitors, we found ourselves noticing some of the things that made us feel welcome in these unfamiliar places and congregations:

- the church website gave clear information about when and where services were happening
- people at the door were friendly and welcoming: recognising that we might be visitors but not interrogating us!
- activity and engagement for children was provided in some form, and this was explained as we arrived
- at the end of the service, the people sitting nearest to us introduced themselves and drew us into conversation
- we were invited to morning tea, including being shown where it was happening (if not immediately obvious), and being served tea and coffee by people (not get your own, especially not get your own from a coffee machine that many people wouldn't know how to operate...)

No doubt you could add to this list from your own experiences of being a visitor at another church. What acts and gestures of welcome have remained with you as you recall those experiences?

For us, these were mainly the first time we had visited each of these churches (although in some cases we did know some members of the church). So we didn't have the chance to discover what sort of welcome we might have received on a subsequent visit: would anyone remember our names? Would they remember a detail to pick up and continue from previous conversation? Would we even be recognised as having been there before?!?

Being warmly welcomed in an unfamiliar community is a wonderful reminder that the body of Christ is always larger and more diverse than what we can see or know: and yet we can find a place of belonging "wherever two or three are gathered" in Jesus' name.
