

EPIPHANY

AND THE REVEALING OF THE CHRIST

Epiphany literally means "an appearance" or "manifestation", when someone or something is revealed and seen.

In the church calendar, the feast of the Epiphany marks the revealing of Jesus at the start of his life and ministry, and is celebrated on 6th January, at the end of the twelve days of Christmas. We hear the story, as told in Matthew's Gospel, of mysterious learned visitors from the east who come to worship Jesus (probably as a toddler rather than a baby). They can be seen as representing the best wisdom of the wider Gentile world, paying homage to the new king who is Emmanuel, God with us. Their story also introduces the Epiphany theme of light: the light of the star in Matthew's account, and then by extension Jesus as the light of the nations.

The feast of Epiphany originated in the Eastern (Orthodox) Church, where its focus was (and remains) the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist: the moment when the heavens were opened and a voice from heaven declared Jesus to be God's beloved Son. When Epiphany began to be celebrated in the West from the 4th century, its emphasis shifted to the visit of the Magi; the Sunday immediately after Epiphany later became a separate feast of Jesus' baptism.

The third further episode traditionally associated with Epiphany is the wedding feast at Cana, where Jesus turned water into wine. John's Gospel tells that Jesus here "revealed his glory, and his disciples believed in him."

In all of this, Epiphany carries the sense of an appearance, a revelation: of God appearing, being revealed, to Israel and all nations, and to us, in a new way. Jesus is God's extraordinary act of self-revelation, in his birth, baptism, ministry, death, resurrection and ascension.

Gathering in God's name

We meet in God's name, as God's people – children of God in all our rich diversity, with all that we carry from the complexity of our lives.

We turn to God in praise and prayer; this includes recalling all that has separated us from God, and claiming the love and forgiveness that is always held out to us.

The Collect then 'collects' these prayers and turns our attention towards the Bible readings which will follow.

THE COLLECT (PRAYER OF THE DAY)

Everlasting God, who brought the nations to your light and kings to the brightness of your rising: fill the world with your glory, and show yourself to all the nations; through him who is the true light and the bright morning star, Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Opening the Scriptures

The readings come from different parts of the Bible: different perspectives on the great story of God's presence and purpose among us. In the psalm we respond with the ancient words of prayer of God's people.

The sermon adds to our own reflections on the readings, and then we respond by affirming the faith as handed to us from previous generations.

We bring our prayers for the world and the Church, trusting that all things and all people are in God's hands.

FIRST READING

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

Arise! Shine! Your light has come; the LORD's glory has shone upon you. Though darkness covers the earth and gloom the nations, the LORD will shine upon you; God's glory will appear over you. Nations will come to your light

and kings to your dawning radiance.

Lift up your eyes and look all around: they are all gathered; they have come to you.

Your sons will come from far away, and your daughters on caregivers' hips.

Then you will see and be radiant;

your heart will tremble and open wide, because the sea's abundance will be turned over to you;

the nations' wealth will come to you.

Countless camels will cover your land, young camels from Midian and Ephah.

They will all come from Sheba, carrying gold and incense, proclaiming the LORD's praises.

(60.1-6; CEB)

PSALM

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter to the Ephesians.

This is why I, Paul, am a prisoner of Christ for you Gentiles.

You've heard, of course, about the responsibility to distribute God's grace, which God gave to me for you, right? God showed me his secret plan in a revelation, as I mentioned briefly before (when you read this, you'll understand my insight into the secret plan about Christ). Earlier generations didn't know this hidden plan that God has now revealed to his holy apostles and prophets through the Spirit. This plan is that the Gentiles would be coheirs and parts of the same body, and that they would share with the Jews in the promises of God in Christ Jesus through the gospel. I became a servant of the gospel because of the grace that God showed me through the exercise of his power.

God gave his grace to me, the least of all God's people, to preach the good news about the immeasurable riches of Christ to the Gentiles. God sent me to reveal the secret plan that had been hidden since the beginning of time by God, who created everything. God's purpose is now to show the rulers and powers in the heavens the many different varieties of his wisdom through the church. This was consistent with the plan he had from the beginning of time that he accomplished through Christ Jesus our Lord. In Christ we have bold and confident access to God through faith in him.

A reading from the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in the territory of Judea during the rule of King Herod, magi came from the east to Jerusalem. They asked, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We've seen his star in the east, and we've come to honour him."

When King Herod heard this, he was troubled, and everyone in Jerusalem was troubled with him. He gathered all the chief priests and the legal experts and asked

them where the Christ was to be born. They said, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for this is what the prophet wrote:

You, Bethlehem, land of Judah, by no means are you least among the rulers of Judah, because from you will come one who governs, who will shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod secretly called for the magi and found out from them the time when the star had first appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search carefully for the child. When you've found him, report to me so that I too may go and honour him." When they heard the king, they went; and look, the star they had seen in the east went ahead of them until it stood over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were filled with joy. They entered the house and saw the child with Mary his mother. Falling to their knees, they honoured him. Then they opened their treasure chests and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Because they were warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went back to their own country by another route.

SERMON

NICENE CREED

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church: We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures: he ascended into heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Celebrating at the Lord's table

At the greeting of peace, we recognise that God's gift of peace constantly renews our human relationships and forms us as the Body of Christ.

Our offerings of money and groceries remind us that we are called to participate with our lives and livelihoods in the coming of God's kingdom of justice, healing and peace.

In the Great Thanksgiving, the priest voices the prayer of the whole assembly, recalling the mighty acts of God, Jesus' saving death and resurrection, and his last meal with his friends. The prayer calls on the Holy Spirit to make Christ present in our sharing of bread and wine, and to remake us as Christ's body in the world. We respond with the Lord's Prayer, as the crucified and risen Jesus prays anew through us.

Our sharing is a gift of grace, a communion with Jesus and with each other. There is a place here for each and every person.

Our Saviour Christ is the Prince of Peace. Of the increase of his government and of peace there shall be no end.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

The gifts of God for the people of God.

Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

This is the Lord's table. All who seek God's mercy are welcome.

Everyone is invited to share communion or to receive a blessing. Children who have been baptised are welcome to share communion. All the communion bread will have wine added to it, but if you also wish to drink from the common cup then please remain and it will be brought to you. If you would prefer not to share communion but to receive a blessing, please indicate when the priest comes to you.

While communion is being shared, we sing:

Take, O take me as I am; summon out what I shall be; set your seal upon my heart and live in me.

The Eucharist is food for the journey of faith, whatever awaits us as we go out to the rest of our lives. We have been renewed, transformed, and blessed: now we take that blessing to share with others, in our words and actions, our hearts and lives.

SHARING THE PATH OF FAITH

reflections from the clergy and our parish community

Dear pilgrims, hello from your assistant curate! A few days before Christmas I returned from a brief and wonderful trip to Israel and Palestine. It was a very special journey, and it is good to be back with you all.

If you were with us Christmas morning, you may have noticed that while I was away I was somewhat taken with the little town of Bethlehem. Bethlehem is like a small world of white stone in the midst of the rocky Judean desert. It is a world of *hospitality*, too. In the first century pilgrims often stopped at Bethlehem for supplies on their way to Jerusalem; today Christian pilgrims come *to* Bethlehem and indeed find plenty of welcome and refreshment while there. However, the reality is that for the people of Bethlehem, life has become profoundly difficult over the past two generations, and I want to share with you something about that reality.

The people of Bethlehem live in the shadow of a great partition wall that cuts them off from all land in the hands of the state of Israel. They have to apply for a permit from Israel every time they want to cross it. The town is now also wedged between Israeli settlements (which are illegal under international law), and which have been built in part by seizing West Bank land from Palestinian families who have lived there for hundreds of years. These settlements have separated families from their farmlands, prevented development like the construction of a new hospital, and claimed the local water sources, so the people of Bethlehem are forced to buy their own water back from the settler communities.

Bethlehem is home to one of the oldest unbroken Christian communities in the world, yet over the past two generations the Christians there have dwindled. Where Christians made up 90% of the population in 1950, now they comprise about 10%. A Lutheran pastor, based in Bethlehem, has composed this prayer in the hope that Christians around the world might pray for the church in Bethlehem: Lord God our Father, who made yourself known to us in your Son, Jesus Christ, born in Bethlehem, grant to Palestinian Christians who live in Bethlehem today and throughout the Holy Land, resilience to endure and remain in the land and to continue the Christian witness. We pray for all Palestinians to be steadfast under pressure. Amen.

On the feast of Epiphany, when we celebrate three distinguished strangers coming to Bethlehem to find Jesus, the King of the Jews, and the Saviour of all nations, let us pray with the people of Bethlehem, praying for their succour now, and for the coming of the day when all nations in the world will find a common home in Him.
